FEDERAL SPECIFICATION

CARTON, EGG

This amendment, which forms a part of Federal Specification UU-C-225A, dated August 4, 1972, was approved by the Commissioner, Federal Supply Service, General Services Administration, for the use of all Federal agencies.

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Paragraph 1.2, delete "Type II - 3 rows of 4 cells".

Paragraph 2.1, delete title of "UU-P-268" and substitute "Paper, Kraft, Wrapping".

Delete title of "Fed. Std. No. 123" and substitute "Marking for Shipment (Civil Agencies)".

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Paragraph 3.1, add - "The materials used in the manufacture of class I molded pulp and class II paperboard shall be 100 percent reclaimed fibers. Reclaimed fibers shall conform to 3.1.1 or 3.1.2."

Add new paragraphs.

3.1.1 Post consumer wastes (Part I),

3.1.1.1 Paper, paperboard and fibrous wastes from factories, retail stores, office buildings, homes, etc., after they have passed through their end-usage as a consumer item, including: used corrugated boxes; old newspapers; old magazines; mixed waste paper; tabulating cards; and used cordage.

3.1.1.2 All paper, paperboard and fibrous wastes that enter and are collected from municipal solid waste.

3.1.2 Manufacturing, forest residues and other wastes (Part II).

3.1.2.1 Dry paper and paperboard waste generated after completion of papermaking process (i.e. those manufacturing operations up to and including the cutting and trimming of the paper machine reel into small rolls or rough sheets) including: envelope cuttings, bindery trimmings, and other paper and paperboard waste, resulting from printing, cutting, forming and other converting operations; bag, box and carton manufacturing wastes; and butt rolls, mill wrappers, and rejected unused stock.

3.1.2.2 Finished paper and paperboard from obsolete inventories of paper and paperboard manufacturers, merchants, wholesalers, dealers, printers, converters or others.

3.1.2.3 Fibrous by-products of harvesting, manufacturing, extractive, or wood-cutting processes, flax straw, linters, bagasse, slash, and other forest residues.
